Know Your Rights Fliers from NWIRP

When the government arrests or tries to arrest someone, or when a government official or police officer "just wants to talk," every person in the United States has certain basic rights. These rights apply to everyone, regardless of citizenship. Be familiar with your rights and help protect others by informing them of their rights with these fliers.

New Community Rights with Police and Federal Immigration Authorities in Washington State

Washington State Legislature passed the Keep Washington Working Act in 2019 to protect the rights of immigrant communities from unnecessary contact with ICE (Immigration and Customs Enforcement and CBP (Customs and Border Patrol). The new law requires that police and jails change their practices and policies to ensure the privacy of all Washingtonians.

Bystander & Observer Guidelines

The Washington State Immigrant Solidarity Network (WAISN) has created fliers for bystanders and observers during immigration enforcement activities. In the U.S everyone has certain constitutional rights and protections regardless of their immigration status or who is president. You have the legal right to film the police and/or immigration officers if they are in a public place and if the filming does not impede the performance of their duties.
